Portland Art Museum showcases rare collection of Northwest Native American art

The Portland Art Museum has been tracing Oregon's artistic roots for the past few years and has come up with an exhibit that's one-of-a-kind.

People of the River: Native Arts of the Oregon Territory is the first museum show in history to explore the unique sculpture, basketry and beadwork of the Native Americans who lived along the Columbia River for more than 10,000 years.

"Many people say there's no real history here," says Bill Mercer, the curator of Native American art for the Portland Art Museum. "There's plenty of great history here—you just have to look around." The exhibition runs through May 29.
